Step #2: Gale Virtual Reference Library = e-books

Login ID: wildcats

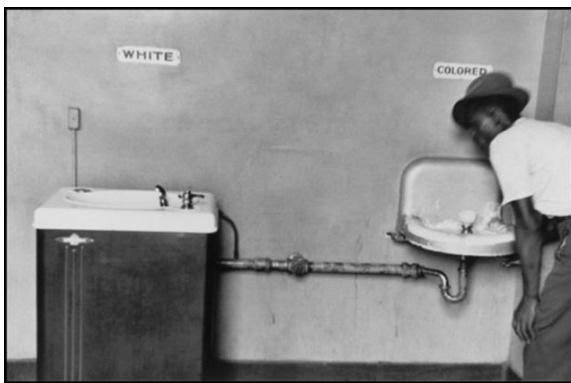
Areas to Use: Enter using the **Gale Resource Center**, then conduct a “basic search” or search specific resources.

Use “advanced search” if you want to restrict your search.

Citation: Information is at the end of the article.

Step #3: Use Databases

Use the journal articles and materials from the school’s databases. If you are accessing the databases from home you will need to use the username and passwords provided. <http://lhwildcats.org/library>

Username: libertyville	Password: wildcats
Areas to Use:	Click on the "Search All" tab for the easiest search. Be sure to read the entry type to prevent needless clicking or select a filter option on the left-hand side of the page
Citation and Annotation:	MLA citation is at the bottom of the article.

Annals of America	
Username: libertyville	Password: wildcats
Areas to Use:	On the Home Page just make a general search or search by your person's name. Resist using only the 'author' search since your person may not have written anything This supplies primary sources only.
Citation and Annotation:	Citation is at the end of the article and must be placed in MLA format.

EbscoHost	
Username: libertyville	Password: wildcats
Areas to Use:	Magazine, Newspaper, Health, Images, Bios, etc. Click on "select all." Do a basic search but be sure to check the "full text" box. Click the 'sort by' to relevance.
Citation and Annotation:	Click on "cite" at the right-hand side of the page under "Tools". Be sure citation is in MLA style.

Facts on File	
Username: libertyville	Password: wildcats
Areas to Use:	Click on the relevant product either “American History Online” or “World Geography and Culture” option then generate a basic search. Click on appropriate tabs for faster results.
Citation and Annotation:	Citation is at the end of the article. Double check that it is in MLA format not in Chicago style.

Username: libertyville	
Areas to Use:	Select the “US History in Context ” or “Global Issues in Context”. Click on the person/ subject/advanced option or simply do a basic search.
Citation and Annotation	Click on the “Citation Tools” in the “Tool” bar on the right-hand side. Select the MLA 7 th edition— then follow the steps or copy the citation from the end of the article.

ProQuest History Center:	
Login ID libertyville	Password: wildcats
Areas to Use:	Select “ProQuest Historical Newspapers” for primary sources documents. Could sort by “most relevant articles first” if you select an era. *Caution—do not use a recent article about a topic from the past as a primary source. Example: an article from 1976 on George Washington.
Citation:	“Citation/Abstract” tab is at the top of the page or use information at the top of the article. Must create the citation.



Step #4: Find information on the Internet

Google.

Set up a good internet search and remember to use the “+” and “-“ symbols to narrow down the search.

For example: Apartheid in South Africa
Apartheid “South Africa” +economy -.com +.gov

Google Books

Find digitized books. Must click on the title to explore its possibilities (used to be able to read if it was full text, snippet view or just a review.)
